## Kristin Bernhard Shares What It Means to Be a 2018 Ascend Fellow

Kristin Bernhard, Deputy Commissioner for System Reform, is among 20 leaders recently selected by the Aspen Institute to be a part of their Ascend Fellows for the Class of 2018. The program is a national competitive fellowship, for which people from across the country and from a variety of fields are invited to apply.

The Aspen Institute is a non-partisan think tank based in Washington, D.C. but with campuses around the world. The institution was founded to bring leaders together to collaborate, coordinate, innovate, and help make the world a better place. Aspen has numerous policy programs, including Ascend, which focuses on ideas and collaborations that move children and their parents toward educational success and economic security. Ascend utilizes two-generation strategies addressing the needs of children and the adults in their lives together.

One of the main focuses of Ascend is leadership development, so every two years the Institute selects a class of fellows to develop professionally and to connect with each other on a variety of issues. Each fellow has a different way of tackling two-generation work. For example, a fellow from New York City has a role similar to Bernhard's in an organization like DECAL but with a city focus.

"I'm thrilled to join this impressive cohort of leaders advancing strategies to lift children and their families together," said Bernhard. "I look forward to bringing back knowledge to inform Georgia's own two-generation efforts. We know this approach will help more families in Georgia access opportunity and achieve economic self-sufficiency."

The kick off was held October 16 in Aspen, Colorado at the Aspen Institute. Over the next 18 months, Bernhard will spend time with the other fellows learning and discussing what each person is working on to strengthen their work. They will also develop action plans for what they want to accomplish during their time as Ascend Fellows.

"The goal of my participation will be to strengthen and support our agency's existing two-generation work that began as part of the Parents and Children Thriving Together (PACTT) grant," said

Two years ago, Georgia was awarded a \$90,000 PACTT grant from the National Governors Association and the Center for Law and Social Policy to launch a two-generation policy. The goals of this grant have been accomplished. Since then DECAL has been working with the Technical College System of Georgia and the University System of Georgia to support parents pursuing associate's and bachelor's degrees and certificates to acquire skills and credentials that help them get a job paying a living wage.

"One of the things I'm really excited about is the other people in this fellowship class. I'm hoping some of them can come here to share what they're working on in their state or city," Bernhard said.

## DECAL Launching Early Education Community Partnership Initiatives Statewide

DECAL is launching an Early Education Community Partnership initiative in each of its six regions to spark new, local efforts to improve and better coordinate a system of supports for children from birth to age 8. The statewide initiative expands the work that began four years ago in areas known as Early Education Empowerment Zones or E3Zs.

E3Zs were targeted regions of Georgia that agreed to work with DECAL and other state agencies to pilot early education system reform initiatives to increase the quality of and access to early care and learning options and to foster partnerships to support better outcomes for young children. The E3Zs were a part of DECAL's Race to the Top: Early Learning Challenge (RTT-ELC) federal grant, which ends this year.

To support, sustain, and expand the work done in the E3Zs, System Reform is creating a new unit -- Early Education Community Partnership Regions -- to focus on building better relationships with communities across the state around early education. A coordinator will be assigned to each of DECAL's six regions. They will work with community partners to coordinate the delivery of state and local services for young children and families; to support and seek to improve the quality of child care settings; to provide opportunities for conversations about access to high-quality child care; to work with community stakeholders to align early childhood systems for children ages birth to 8; and to create public awareness of early education services.

"We are excited about working with local leaders to empower their communities to support early education," said Jill O'Meara, Early Education Community Partnership Manager. "There are a lot of great organizations and initiatives for education already in place in these regions, and we want to support those and ensure that the early education voice is at the table."

## Commissioner Presents Golden Radish and Baby Golden Radish Awards

Eighty-four of Georgia's 181 school districts received recognition for Farm-to-School Program excellence at the Fifth Annual Golden Radish Awards at the Georgia Freight Depot. These districts served more than 1.3 million students a whopping 109 million school meals with locally grown food. They also taught more than 61,000 curriculum-based lessons incorporating food and agriculture.

The Golden Radish Awards honor Georgia school districts for best practices in Farm-to-School Programs. Best practices include local food procurement, exposing students to new foods through taste tests, and incorporating cooking and gardening activities into class curriculums. This year, the Golden Radish Partners are Georgia Organics, Georgia Department of Agriculture, Georgia Department of Education, Georgia Department of Public Health, UGA Extension Service, and DECAL.

## State and Local Leaders Celebrate Georgia Pre-K Week by Visiting Pre-K Centers

Georgia's Pre-K Program is now in its 26th year, and hundreds of state and local leaders celebrated by reading to the state's youngest learners during the annual Georgia Pre-K Week observed October 1-5.

The lottery-funded Georgia's Pre-K Program was launched in 1992 by Governor Zell Miller as a pilot program serving 750 four year olds. Since then, the program has laid a solid foundation for academic excellence and future success in the lives of approximately 1.6 million children.



Now in its eighth year, Georgia Pre-K Week is coordinated by Voices for Georgia's Children, a policy and advocacy non-profit organization. The goal of Pre-K week is to emphasize the importance of quality early childhood education by providing opportunities for leaders to engage with Pre-K classrooms in local communities.

Countless state, business, and community leaders visited Pre-K centers around the state the first week of October to witness early learning in action. Nearly three out of every four state legislators, and nearly half of Georgia's congressional delegation have participated in the event since it began in 2010.

"We are grateful to see Georgia's state and local leaders celebrate Georgia's Pre-K Program," said Commissioner Amy M. Jacobs. "By participating in Pre-K week activities, our leaders show parents and the public that they value quality early education and its impact on students, families, and our state."

Celebrating Georgia Pre-K Week isn't limited to the first week of October. Thursday, October 25, 2018, was a very special day as First Lady Sandra Deal was joined by former First Lady Shirley Miller, wife of the late Senator and Governor Zell Miller, along with her grandson Bryan Miller, CEO of the Zell Miller Foundation. They visited Dahlonge Country Day Academy, owned by Heather and Wes Chambers. The Chambers are part of the inaugural class of the Zell Miller Leadership Institute.

Mrs. Miller read "The Little Engine That Could," one of her husband's favorites. Mrs. Deal read "Rainbow Fish."
