Heatstroke Deaths of Children in Vehicles





TIPS NHTSA (2012)

CSN

Never leave children in a vehicle unattended, even with the windows cracked, even "for a minute"

Always check the backseat when exiting the vehicle (put your phone or your purse in the backseat to create a reminder system)

Always keep vehicle doors and trunks locked and keys out of reach

Make an agreement with your childcare provider to always call you when your child is absent

Call 911 if you see a child alone in a vehicle

NEW This Summer: Monitoring Visits for Exempt Programs

Overview for Category #1 & #7 Exempt Programs

In October 2016updated rules went into effect for all licensed child care programs to helpensure the health and safety for children in care. The federal Child Care

andDevelopment Block Grant (CCDBG) Act of 2014 made those rule updates necessary. The revised rules require all staff with direct care responsibilities to complete **Health & Safety Orientation Certificate** trainingplus **CPR & First Aid** training (if not currently certified). The new federal rules also require staff members who work in EXEMPT programs to complete Health & Safety Orientation and CPR & First Aid training. Child Care Services began monitoring for compliance on June 1, 2017. Following are important time frames:

- New staff membershired on or after October 1, 2016 must obtain the Health & SafetyOrientation Certificate and CPR/First Aid training within 90 days ofemployment.
- Staff hired beforeOctober 1, 2016 must complete the Health & Safety Orientation Certificatetraining and CPR and First Aid training (if not currently certified) by June30, 2017.
- Also, to comply with the federal requirements, we have made changes in the posting of
 inspections and other information. Licensing visit reports will now be posted on
 ourwebsite for up to five years from the date of the inspection. Revocationnotices and
 other adverse action notices will also be posted for public viewing.

You and your staffcan access a free online module for the Health & Safety OrientationCertificate through Better Kid Care, Pennsylvania State University. Sign in to the OnDemand option, and then choose the module called "Georgia Health and SafetyOrientation Training (for Georgia child care providers only)." You can also find additional training options at: Health & Safety Orientation.

On May 22, 2017, Child Care Services hosted a webinar that covered the CCDF Monitoring Visits and it provided an overview for category #1 and #7 exempt programs receiving the CAPS subsidy. On June 20, 2017 a letter was sent to programs in the DECAL database about employees who have a current satisfactory background checkdetermination (based on a national fingerprint check), but still need to receive the **comprehensive** background check determination. All childcare employees who received this letter already have a **regular** "Sat" letter; however they need to **update** their information so that DECAL canissue a **comprehensive** "Sat" letter.

- Theydo not need to fingerprint again at this time. They need only to click on the link, submittheir SSN and DOB and then update their application according to theinstructions.
- DECALwill check the GA Child Abuse Registry and National Sex OffenderRegistry at no additional cost for everyone who updates the application.
- If anyone has lived in another state/territory/tribal land within the past five years, a
 check will need to be done through that state to search for criminal history and
 placement on that state's child abuse registry. There will likely be additional costs

- associated with this part of the process. Instructions on how to procure these records from out of state will be sent July 1, 2017.
- A new letter will be issued to you and to employees. It will be called a
 "ComprehensiveBackground Check Determination Letter," and it will replace
 theirclearance current letter. The current letter should suffice as adequateclearance
 until the new letter is issued, as long as it has not expired.
- Theseupdates must be submitted as soon as possible, but by no later than October 1,2017.

Free Training!

DECAL recently launched the Learn the Signs. Act Early.initiative to help child care providers in Georgia better understanddevelopmental milestones and their role in monitoring children's development. initiative is in conjunction with the CDC's national Learn the Signs. Act Early.campaign. As a part of this initiative, a Developmental Monitoring Intro Pack was mailed to approximately 5,400 licensed and exempt child care providers across the state. The mailing targeted licensed andexempt providers serving children birth to age five. The intropack contains a letter from the Commissioner outlining the initiative, a one-page flyer with instructions for completing the trainingmodules and requesting a Developmental Starter Kit, and two Milestone Momentsbooklets, one in English and one in Spanish. The online training includes a series of four modules developed by the CDC that will allow providers to obtain one hour of training credit. There is also a fifth module developed by DECAL.
