Literacy	<p><u>Scaredy Squirrel Goes Camping</u> Ask your child why Scaredy Squirrel is afraid? What is something he is afraid of while camping?</p>	<p><u>Pete the Cat Goes Camping</u> After listening to this story, ask your child to recall all the things Pete's family did on their camping trip.</p>	<p><u>Little Critter: Being Thankful</u> After reading, ask your child to recall what happened in the beginning, middle, and end of the story.</p>	<p><u>Thanksgiving is for Giving Thanks</u> Ask your child to draw picture placemats for the Thanksgiving table.</p>	<p><u>Goodnight Campsite</u> Talk about some of the places you spotted the little squirrel in the illustrations on each page.</p>
Phonological Awareness	<p><u>Camping Rhyme Time</u> Together, generate a list of words related to camping, such as: tent, fire, hike, etc. Now see how many rhyming words your child can think of for each word on the list.</p>	<p><u>What Do You Hear?</u> Ask your child to name the sound (not the letter) he hears at the beginning of these pairs of words: fish–fire; cat-camp, woods-water, boots-bed, day-dark, hike-hoot</p>	<p><u>What's for Dinner?</u> Give your child clues by segmenting words, and see if she can guess what's for Thanksgiving dinner: Examples: tur-key, dress-ing, gra-vy, po-ta-toes, etc.</p>	<p><u>It's Turkey Rhyming Time</u> As you listen to the story, challenge your child to name the part of the turkey that rhymes with each clue.</p>	<p><u>A Turkey is a Funny Bird</u> Teach your child this rhyme: A turkey is a funny bird. Its head goes wobble, wobble. And all it knows is just one word: "Gobble, gobble, gobble."</p>

Math & Science	<p><u>Be a Shape Hunter</u> Go shape hunting with Shawna the Shape Hunter. After watching, go outside and see what shapes you can find!</p>	<p><u>Positional Words</u> Challenge your child to follow the piece of cheese as it goes above, below, in front of, behind, inside, outside, beside, and between the boxes.</p>	<p><u>Five Little Turkeys</u> Sing and count the five little turkeys. Ask, "What number comes before five? What number comes after five?" Continue with other numbers.</p>	<p><u>Fun Facts About Turkeys!</u> After listening to these amazing turkey facts, ask your child to name the most interesting things he learned about turkeys.</p>	<p><u>Count to Ten</u> After watching, find 10 items around your home to count, such as spoons or forks in the kitchen, acorns or leaves in the yard.</p>
Motor Skills	<p>Using playdoh and colored toothpicks have your child make a turkey by rolling the dough into a ball and adding toothpick feathers. Make a pattern and see if your child can copy and continue the pattern.</p>	<p><u>Camping Clothesline</u> Have your child hang up "hiking" socks on a clothesline with clothespins. Can your child match the socks into pairs? Count how many total, then count the pairs...compare.</p>	<p><u>Thanksgiving Games</u> Have your child pretend to be a turkey and guide her to escape the turkey farm by running and dodging all the obstacles in the video.</p>	<p><u>Do the Turkey Hop</u> After singing and dancing to the Turkey Hop, see how long you and your child can balance on one leg. Change legs, then try a different pose.</p>	<p><u>Oodles of Noodles</u> With a bowl of noodles (or other small items) on one side and an empty bowl on the other, have your child transfer noodles from bowl to bowl using tongs or a spoon.</p>
Social Emotional	<p><u>I'm Scared</u> Talk with your child about feeling scared and how pausing to take a breath can help soothe those feelings.</p>	<p><u>S'mores Time</u> After singing with Auntie B., talk with your child about the importance of sharing and taking turns.</p>	<p><u>Thankful for Friends</u> After singing this song, discuss with your child their many friends to be thankful for. Include community helper friends, as well!</p>	<p><u>My Gratitude Jar</u> After listening to the story, help your child create his own gratitude jar. Encourage him to write or draw things he is grateful for to add to the jar.</p>	<p><u>Time To Go</u> After singing along to this song, have your child recall what to do whenever it is time to go.</p>
