Make "Care for their Air" work! Involve your Health Services Advisory Committee.

- ✓ Make this issue a priority for your Health Services Advisory Committee (HSAC).
- ✓ Orient committee members to the project's mission—"Improving the overall health and well-being of Head Start children by improving their indoor air quality, especially exposure to secondhand smoke and other environmental asthma triggers."
- ✓ Familiarize HSAC members with the key messages, activities and resources included in the "Care for their Air" project.
- ✓ Ensure messages are conveyed consistently across program options.
- ✓ Identify key HSAC members to champion the program's efforts. These can be community partners identified below or parents, pediatricians or Head Start staff.
- ✓ Assist the program to ensure a monitoring system is in place for staff to document their work with families in this area. This may mean using existing tracking systems or creating new ones.



 Assist the program with revising health forms (e.g., health history, health tracking and progress notes) to gather information about children's exposure to secondhand smoke.



- ✓ Assist the program in collecting information regarding asthma, second hand smoke and other triggers as part of your program's community assessment.
- ✓ Use HSAC members' knowledge of the community and best practices for promoting healthy air to develop guidelines for implementation of the project.
- ✓ Develop strategies to help parents and the community-at-large understand this is an important issue that affects all children, not just those whose parents smoke or children who have asthma.
