

Fall Activities for Monday

On the Move

Apple Picking

Nothing says Fall like apple picking.

Materials:

- Contact paper
- Construction paper
- Basket/container

Instructions:

1. Crumple red, yellow, and/or green construction paper into balls.
2. Tape a large piece of contact paper to a cleared wall in your home (sticky side up).
3. Stick the apples to various spots on the contact paper.
4. Provide your child with the basket/container and instruct them to pick the apples and place them in the basket.

Sensory Time

Fall Colors & Textures

Explore the colors of Fall with this textured filled activity.

Materials:

- Bin
- Items of various textures (fall colors)

Instructions:

1. Place textured items in the bin.
2. As your child explores the items, discuss the differences in the textures and colors. (For example, "Is it soft?", "Is it bumpy?", "Is it green or blue?", or "Is there another item that is the same color as this one?")

Story Time

Autumn, Autumn, What Do You See?

Create a fun story about the Autumn season. Gather paper and crayons/markers and use the story, *Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See?*, as an example to guide your story.

Guiding Prompts:

Autumn, Autumn, What Do You See?

- I see a red leaf looking at me
- I see an orange leaf looking at me
- I see a yellow leaf looking at me
- I see a brown leaf looking at me

- I see swaying trees looking at me
- I see apples looking at me
- I see pumpkins looking at me

You and your child can include additional fall items to your story.

Arts and Creativity

Fall Wreath

Let's get ready for Fall by creating a seasonal wreath!

Materials:

- Paper plate
- Scissors
- Glue
- Construction paper (orange, brown, yellow & red)
- White paper
- Crayons/markers (orange, brown, yellow & red)
- Yarn/string

Instructions:

1. Cut out the center of a paper plate.
2. If you do not have construction paper, have your toddler use crayons or markers to color four sheets of white paper with fall colors.
3. Tear your construction paper or colored paper into small pieces and glue them onto the circle.
4. Cover your wreath with the paper until its fully covered. Add fall colored decorations if you would like.
5. Once your wreath is dry, tie a piece of yarn or string around it and have your child decide where to hang your "Fall Wreath!"
