For more than 30 years, RossWoods has served Dalton and surrounding communities, providing compassionate care and support to more than 870 families.



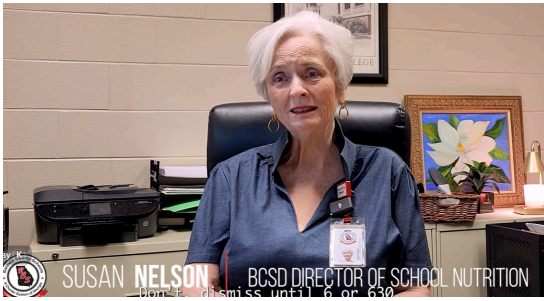

Updated Income Eligibility Guidelines Released

This notice announces the USDA's annual adjustments to the Income Eligibility Guidelines to be used in determining eligibility for free and reduced-price meals, free milk, and Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer benefits for the period from **July 1, 2026 through June 30, 2027**.

These guidelines are used by schools, institutions, and facilities participating in the National School Lunch Program (and Commodity School Program), School Breakfast Program, Special Milk Program for Children, Child and Adult Care Food Program, and Summer Food Service Program.

The guidelines are also used by the states and Indian tribal organizations that administer the Summer Electronic Benefits Transfer for Children Program.

FNS Developing A New Guidance Tool

Civil Rights Compliance and Enforcement

On March 3, 2026, USDA issued policy guidance to ensure that current Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) guidance pertaining to federal civil rights and nondiscrimination obligations remains aligned with applicable laws, regulations, executive orders, and directives relevant to the USDA's 16 nutrition assistance programs.

As part of this effort, FNS is modifying the **FNS Instruction 113-1: Civil Rights Compliance and Enforcement — Nutrition Programs and Activities**. Therefore, USDA is developing a new guidance tool used to provide assistance and direction to FNS employees and recipients of federal financial assistance in accordance with applicable laws and regulations. Amended guidance will be released when finalized.

In the interim, FNS program offices and State agencies are advised to immediately discontinue citing FNS Instruction 113-1 when there are noncompliance issues or concerns resulting from management evaluations (MEs), compliance reviews or any similar monitoring and oversight activities, and to discontinue FNS Instruction 113-1 for technical guidance. Rather, pertinent civil rights and nondiscrimination laws and regulations should be cited and used instead.

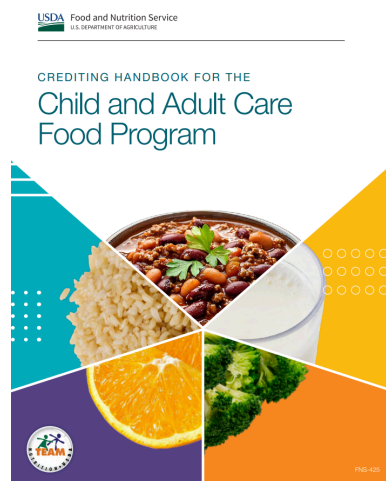
CACFP Crediting Handbook Revised

The handbook works with the **Food Buying Guide for Child Nutrition Programs** to help with crediting foods and planning meals.

Georgia ATLAS Average Daily Attendance (ADA) Claim Enhancement Released

The Nutrition Division has released a new GA ATLAS Average Daily Attendance (ADA) claim enhancement to ensure data accuracy and to prevent invalid claim submissions.

What is Changing?

Effective immediately, the ADA in your claim cannot exceed the ADA listed in your site application. If the claim ADA is higher, you will receive the following error in the claim section: “Child Care Claim ADA cannot exceed Site Application ADA.”

How to Resolve the Error

If you encounter this message, you must take one of the following actions before you can submit your claim:

1. Adjust the claim: Decrease the ADA in the claim section so it matches or is less than the ADA in site application.
2. Update the site application: Update the ADA in the site application and any other applicable sections.

Steps To Update Your Site Application

Make all required updates in the site application.

Independent Centers: Complete and submit the [site change notification form](#) to your assigned Application Specialist via email for processing.

Sponsors: Complete and submit the [sponsor update form](#) to your assigned Business Operations Specialist via email for processing.

How to File a CACFP Claim for Reimbursement

To receive reimbursement, institutions must submit monthly CACFP claims through the GA ATLAS system. Original claims must be submitted within 30 days after the end of the claiming month, with up to two revisions allowed within 60 days.

Before submitting, ensure all records are complete and accurate, including menus, attendance, enrollment, and Income Eligibility Statements (IES). All information must be reconciled to confirm that only eligible meals and participants are included.

For-profit centers must also meet the 25% eligibility requirement each month to qualify. Accurate reporting and timely submission help ensure compliance and prevent delays in reimbursement.

Specific Prior Written Approval (SPWA) Submission and Approval Process

Specific Prior Written Approval (SPWA) is a process sponsors use to get approval for certain purchases or costs not already included in their approved program budget. It ensures that program funds are spent appropriately, comply with federal and state regulations, and support the integrity of the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and Summer Food Service Program (SFSP).

To submit a SPWA, follow these guidelines:

- Sponsors with an emergency request, must email the [SPWA request form](#) with supporting documentation to Gwendolyn.howard@decalf.ga.gov within 24 hours of purchase and then submit a budget revision to include the cost.
- For all other requests, sponsors must submit a budget revision to include the cost, upload the [SPWA request form](#) and supporting documents to the attachments list section in GA ATLAS, and notify the budget team via email at Nutritionbudget@decalf.ga.gov at least three days before making the purchase.
- DECAL will review the request and provide an approval or denial status in writing, including any special considerations or reasons. The SPWA will be signed and uploaded to the attachment list section in GA ATLAS.

Physical Activity Corner

Spring Into Active Play

Spring is here, and it is a great time to get moving. As the weather warms up, stay hydrated with plenty of water and have fun exploring the great outdoors.

Here are spring movement ideas:

Infants: (0–12 months):

- **Spring Sensory Movement:** Place soft, colorful toys or scarves around babies during tummy time. Encourage reaching, lifting the head, and turning.
- **Rolling Like Raindrops:** During outdoor play, gently help babies roll from side to side on a soft blanket while they explore new sights, sounds, and textures.



Toddlers (1–3 years):

- **Animal Parade:** Call out spring animals and encourage children to move like that animal. They can hop like bunnies, flap like birds, and crawl like caterpillars. Great for gross motor skills and imagination.
- **Bubble Chase:** Outdoor bubbles encourage running, jumping, popping, reaching, and so much more- [check out this handout for more ideas](#).

Preschoolers (3–5 years):

- **Rainy Day Obstacle Course:** If April showers hit, bring the fun inside! Children can hop over pillows, balance on a tape line, or crawl through a tunnel. [Check out this handout for more rainy-day ideas](#).
- **Take Learning Outside:** Go on a short nature walk, collect sticks or leaves for sorting, create a nature-inspired obstacle course, or complete a [Nature Bingo Card](#) and go hunting.

As educators and caregivers, maintaining constant supervision is essential to ensure children's safety during both indoor and outdoor play.

How was my customer service?
