Annual Renewal Requirements due September 30

Participating CACFP Sponsors and Institutions are required to meet annual renewal requirements by September 30, 2023. The Nutrition Division opened registration for the required annual training on July 14, 2023, and opened enrollment for the application renewal on August 1, 2023.

Step 1: Complete Annual Training Requirements

Registration for the CACFP Annual Training requirements opened on July 14. These requirements include:

- Reviewing the CACFP 2024 Annual Training presentation in GA ATLAS
- Completing the CACFP 2024 Annual Training Test Assessment in GA ATLAS

Once the annual training assessment has been completed and submitted, you will receive access to the FY 2023-2024 CACFP application.

Step 2: Enroll in FY 2024

Upon completion of the Annual Training and Assessment, the CACFP application for the associated program year will change the institution or sponsor's status to "Not Enrolled" and the "Enroll" button will be available.

• Enroll into FY 2024

Step 3: Submit your FY 2024 Application on or before September 30

Original or Annual Budgets and Budget Amendments must also be submitted on or before September 30, 2023.

Please Note: Failure to complete the annual requirements by the specified deadline date will impact continued participation in the CACFP, which includes submission of monthly claims for reimbursement.

Determine Estimated Food Costs & Procurement Methods for FY24

Before saying goodbye to CACFP Fiscal Year 2023, ensure food costs and supporting documents for the procurement method(s) used are submitted, received, and approved by DECAL before September 30, 2023, 7 CFR 226.16(e).

As the new CACFP Fiscal Year 2024 approaches, now is the time to assess your budget to determine the estimated food costs and procurement method(s) before the year begins.

All CACFP program operators planning to participate in the CACFP FY 2024 must adhere to the Federal procurement regulations 7 CFR 226.22 and procurement standards 2 CFR Part 200.317-326 when procuring foods, supplies, equipment, and other goods and services for CACFP.

For informal procurement, price comparisons must be obtained and documented for costs below the Small Acquisition Threshold (SAT) of \$250,000. For formal procurement, a CACFP program operator must conduct an Invitation for Bid (IFB) and Request for Proposal (RFP) for foods, goods, and services that exceed the SAT of \$250,000.

DECAL issued Election Notices to CACFP program operators that utilized formal procurement in FY 2023 with established contracts. Please complete and submit the Procurement Election Notice if you have not already. Also, visit the **DECAL Procurement** website to download updated procurement documents for formal and informal procedures.

Are you required to submit a FY2024 CACFP Annual Budget?

If your organization meets any of the criteria below, you must submit a FY2024 CACFP budget by September 30, 2023:

CACFP Independent Institutions (7 CFR 226.7 (g))

- Required to submit a budget with their initial application and annually thereafter if:
- The center project costs that require prior, specific prior written approval or to use the meal reimbursement to pay for allowable administrative expenses;
- **or**, has previously approved FY2023 costs that require supporting documentation annually

Any costs that have been previously approved in FY2023 that were not self-prep food costs under \$250k, non-food costs under \$250k, and operating labor costs **will require** you to submit an annual budget.

CACFP Sponsors of Affiliated & Unaffiliated Centers (7 CFR 226.6 (f))

• Required to submit a budget annually under all circumstances.

CACFP Day Care Homes (DCH) Sponsors (7 CFR 226.7 (g))

• Required to submit a budget annually under all circumstances.

At-Risk Afterschool Waivers Available during Unanticipated School Closures

On August 30, 2023, DECAL was approved by USDA to grant CACFP At-Risk Afterschool Meal Component facilities waivers for the following:

- Non-Congregate Meal Service
- Parent and Guardian Meal Pick-up
- Meal Service Times
- At-Risk Enrichment Activities

You may access the waiver request approvalhere.

These waivers can only be utilized during unanticipated school closures resulting from natural disasters, unscheduled major building repairs, court orders relating to school safety or other issues, labor-management disputes or when approved by DECAL for similar unanticipated causes.

In order for an At-Risk Afterschool Meal Component facility to utilize the above-mentioned waivers, the facility:

- Must be approved to operate the At-Risk Afterschool Meal Component program;
- Must be located in an area impacted by an unanticipated school closure resulting from natural disasters, unscheduled major building repairs, court orders relating to school safety or other issues, labor-management disputes or when approved by DECAL for similar unanticipated causes; and
- Must limit the use of the waivers to no more than 10 consecutive days. In situations that may warrant a longer time period, Food Nutrition Service (FNS) approval will be required.

CACFP organizations must seek approval to utilize these waivers and can request their usage through the waiver module in GA ATLAS.

Please note: If desiring to utilize the Home Delivery or Parent/Guardian Pick-up meal service models, CACFP organizations must complete and attach in the waiver module, the USDA Waiver Request Addendum, which can be found **here**.

Nutrition Ed Nook *Apples: Crisp and Delicious*

Crisp and delicious apples are September's Harvest of the Month spotlight. Apples are a good source of **vitamin C**, which supports healthy gums, skin, and blood; **potassium**, which helps lower blood pressure; and **fiber**, which helps keep you regular, controls blood sugar and lowers cholesterol. Eat the peel to get the



most from this nutritional powerhouse. Apples are a great low-calorie snack that are naturally fat and sodium-free.

Apple season in Georgia is July to December. North Georgia is the center of the state's apple industry with more than 85% grown in Gilmer and Fannin counties. The state's apple varieties include Fuji, Golden Delicious, Granny Smith, Red Delicious, and more.

Fun Fact: Did you know (**#DYK**) apples, apricots, blackberries, cherries, peaches, pears, plums, raspberries, and strawberries are all members of the rose family?

Integration:

- Apple Sandwiches
- Cranberry Applesauce
- Chicken Apple Salad Wrap
- Fall Apple Pumpkin Oatmeal
- Apples with Raspberry Fruit Dip

Education:

- *Watch* the *Harvest with Holly* video that explores the Harvest of the Month spotlight, how these items grow, where they grow in Georgia, and how they get from the farms to school meals all across the state of Georgia.
- *Compare & Contrast* different apple varieties, such as Granny Smith, Gala, Fuji, using the five senses, look, feel, taste, sound, and smell.
- **Read aloud Bring Me Some Apples and I'll Make You a Pie: A Story About Edna Lewis by Robbin Gourley**. Long before the natural-food movement gained popularity, before greenmarkets sprouted across the United States, Edna Lewis championed purity of ingredients, regional cuisine, and the importance of bringing food directly from the farm to the table. The story follows Edna from early spring through the growing season to a family dinner celebrating a successful harvest.
- *Talk* with families about how participants can help with meal preparation such as choosing which apples to buy at the store or rinsing apples under cool running water. **Bonus:** Send recipes home with families for them to incorporate apples into their meals!

Conversation:

- Have the children you serve eaten apples before?
- What is their favorite way to eat apples?
- What is their favorite color apple to eat?

Physical Activity Corner:



Make Time for Activities, Games and Movement

Physical activity, exploration, and play are critical for all ages, especially our youngest learners. Through this, children develop coordination and strong, healthy bodies and exercise their minds through sensory play including touching, reaching, grasping, and exploring.

Movement is one of the main ways that children learn, develop, and grow. Each new phase of physical activity development brings new opportunities for learning and

development. An infant might explore by tummy time, touching books, grasping blankets, banging toys, or crawling. A toddler might explore by walking or climbing. Young children are naturally curious and excited to learn about their surrounding environment.

According to the CDC, physical fun such as free unstructured games during playtime helps children develop motor and coordination skills, prevent childhood obesity, and build social and emotional intelligence. A child builds their confidence in a safe enjoyable environment.

Enjoy these fun ideas to get our younger children moving:

- Provide child-friendly sports equipment, like balls, poly spots or throwable beanbags.
- Make time for outdoor play at a park or playground, in the backyard, on a beach or at a football field. Moving around on various surfaces develops strength, balance, and coordination.
- Make an obstacle course ortreasure hunt.
- Provide chalk to draw outside with a child.
- Go for a nature walk. This gets a child moving, and they can also collect leaves, sticks, or pebbles for crafts or pretend play when you get home.
- Younger children can practice coordinating the small movements of their fingers through playdough, blocks, and drawing activities.

Providing children plenty of opportunities to play is one of the best ways to help them grow into curious, creative, healthy, and happy adults equipped with the skills they need today.

Education:

- Read out loud, "Are You Ready to Play Outside?" by Mo Willems.
- *Watch* the video on Movement and Play: Play-based Learning with Dr. Peter Gray.
- **Talk** with families about ways parents, educators, and communities can promote physical activity, movement and play all year round, whether at home, outside, in their local community, at your childcare site, or at their local community recreational areas. **Bonus:** Share **#ActivePlay**, **#OutdoorGames**, **#MovementandPlay**, **#MoveYourWay**, and **#LovePlay** pictures and events that are happening in your communities.

- How do you encourage parents, educators, and staff to engage in physical activity?
- What are fun physical activities for family?
- How do you play with children of different ages?
- Why is family engagement, movement, and play important in physical activity?
