Dear DECAL Co-workers,

There are many things I love about being commissioner of this department, and some of my most special opportunities are made possible by a component of DECAL many of you might not be that familiar with...the **Georgia Foundation for Early Care** + **Learning** (Foundation).

For example, every year, we recognize the superlative work of our state's most exemplary early childhood professionals: the Pre-K Teachers of the Year and the Early



Childhood Education Teachers of the Year. I *love* being able to notify these deserving teachers that they've won. We're able to make these awards (along with many other beneficial projects) because of **funding from the Foundation**.

The Georgia General Assembly created the Foundation in 2017. Initially formed as the fiscal agent to respond quickly to the needs of early learning centers affected by natural disasters, the Foundation — an independent 501(c)(3) organization — is now the exclusive vehicle for supporting innovative programs and various signature projects. The Foundation impacts Georgia's early childhood education efforts from an unmatched vantage point— working with a state agency with the flexibility of a non-profit organization.

Other projects funded by the Foundation:

• The Georgia Children's Cabinet's 2Gen Leadership Academy, a ninemonth initiative that equips leaders from child- and family-serving agencies with the tools to implement holistic, two-generation approaches to serving children and families.

• Early Literacy Alignment Mini Grants (together with the Georgia Foundation for Public Education) to foster collaboration between public elementary schools and Quality Rated child care programs.

 Hurricane Relief: Last year, the Foundation helped 33 early childhood programs impacted by Hurricane Helene restore safe indoor and outdoor learning environments for the children in their care.

Funding for the Foundation comes from other private and corporate non-profits, and 100% of the Foundation's revenue goes to programming efforts, with no philanthropic dollars committed to overhead and administrative costs.

We can all be proud that our state has an entity like the Foundation. Because it exists, DECAL can serve Georgia's children, families, and the early care and education industry in ways not funded by state or federal monies. To learn more about the Foundation, contact Laura Wagner,

GTA 2025 Fall Conference: Foundations That Last – Building Early Language & Literacy Together

On September 26, 2025, the Georgia Training Approval (GTA) team hosted the 2025 Fall Conference at Quality Care for Children in Atlanta. The event welcomed early childhood trainers from across the state for a day of learning, collaboration, and inspiration centered on early language and literacy.

The morning began with a warm welcome and retrospective updates from the GTA team, followed by a lively networking activity during which trainers shared energizers, facilitation tips, and favorite resources, setting the tone for a day of connection and growth.

Dr. Gary Bingham of Georgia State University conducted the plenary session, "Leveraging the Science of Literacy to Promote Powerful and Developmentally Appropriate Learning Experiences from Birth to Kindergarten." The session introduced participants to the science of reading—a body of research that explains how children learn to read and the instructional practices that best support that process. For children from birth to age five, reading science emphasizes oral language, vocabulary development, phonological awareness, and exposure to print—foundational skills that support reading success. Dr. Bingham helped participants understand how these skills can be integrated into appropriate learning experiences.

In the afternoon, participants chose between two concurrent sessions:

- **Dr. Douglas Bell**, Professor at Kennesaw State University, led "Supporting Teachers in Early Literacy: Practical Strategies and Engaging Approaches." This session offered actionable strategies for educators to foster early literacy in the classroom.
- GTA Specialists Janet Herrera and Geanina Armeanu

facilitated "Backward Design, Forward Thinking: Planning Early Language and Literacy Trainings That Work." This hands-on session guided trainers through the process of designing professional development using a backward design framework—starting with desired outcomes and working backward to plan assessments and learning experiences.

The GTA 2025 Conference embodied its theme—**Foundations That Last**—by fostering meaningful dialogue and equipping trainers with tools to build lasting impact in early language and literacy.

Chop, Look, Listen – The Chop, Look, Listen Initiative Helps Child Care Providers, Parents, and other Caregivers protect Georgia's Children

On average, a child dies every five days in the United States from choking on food, with children under age 3 at the greatest risk.

To combat this issue, DECAL is launching a new statewide initiative focusing on ways child care providers, parents, and caregivers can prevent choking in children. The educational campaign, *Chop, Look, Listen*, highlights safety fundamentals to protect Georgia's children from the preventable danger of choking during mealtimes.

DECAL developed Chop, Look, Listen based on data from nearly 500 child care providers across Georgia. The providers acknowledged that understanding appropriate food size by age is a critical need for keeping children safe during mealtimes. The campaign will target child care providers statewide with flyers, posters, social media, and information for parents and caregivers to encourage safe mealtime practices at home.

Key messages include: **Chop** - Prepare the food right; **Look** - Observe kids while eating; **Listen** - Sit with kids and engage.

"This campaign provides child care providers with essential information about preparing food for young children and other actions adults can take to protect children while they eat," said DECAL Commissioner Amy M. Jacobs. "Keeping children safe at mealtimes takes all of us working together to apply common sense strategies related to feeding children."

Young children have an increased risk of choking because their windpipes are narrower (about the

DECAL Announces 2025-2026 Georgia's Pre-K Teachers of the Year

DECAL named its Georgia's Pre-K Teachers of the Year for the 2025/2026 school year. The private school winner is Autumn Hart of Bundle of Joy Academy in Marietta, and the public school winner is Teresa Swaim of West Jackson Elementary School in Hoschton.

Hart and Swaim each receive \$3,000 for themselves and \$4,500 for classroom and program use. Winners serve as ambassadors for Georgia's Pre-K Program by public speaking, representing the program at various meetings, and modeling effective classroom practices.

The finalist nominees submitted a video of small group instruction scored by outside judges, had a CLASS observation, and faced a panel for a personal interview.

"Georgia's Pre-K Program owes its success and effectiveness to the dedicated individuals working with our four-year-olds every day," said DECAL Commissioner Amy M. Jacobs. "These awards are a small token of

Pam Stevens, Deputy Director for Child Care Licensing, said, "Choking is preventable. Young children do not have the cognitive skills, behavioral control, or experience to chew well and eat slowly. Whether you're caring for children in a child care program, at home, or in the community, we all can play a role in reducing choking deaths in Georgia."

The campaign clearly and succinctly provides information about how to chop and prepare food, what sizes are appropriate, and which foods present greater choking hazards. The 15th annual Georgia Pre-K Week held October 6-10 was a resounding success.
