

# Dramatic Play Tips

Use the IQ Guide for the Learning Environment to ensure that all required items are present. The Dramatic Play Area/Center should be large enough, so that several children playing can be active and noisy without interrupting other activities. This area should be one of the largest in the classroom and accommodate five or more children.

### Furnishings:

- **⇒ Housekeeping furniture (3 types/purposes):** 
  - Stove Sink Refrigerator Hutch Grill Washing Machine
- ⇒ **Dress-up clothing storage:** Dress-up clothes should be organized and visible so children can see their choices. Some of the clothes should be hung so children can clearly see them. Additional clothing can be stored in drawers, storage bins or tubs. These should be sorted, organized and clearly labeled with words and pictures. Dress-up clothing should be rotated to maintain interest throughout the year.
- ⇒**Table and chairs:** A small table and chairs should be included in the dramatic play area.
- ⇒Basic shelving for housing dramatic play materials

### Ensure the following basic materials are accessible, labeled, and organized:

- **Dolls**: At least 5 culturally diverse dolls are required.
- **Dress-up props and accessories:** Examples include: purses, hats, shoes, a briefcase, etc.
- Full-length mirror: As children dress-up, they are able to look at themselves and see their entire body. For many children, this may be a first.
- A variety of quality dress-up clothes are accessible (minimum of 6 types): Clothing choices should include a variety of items with which children can identify as a part of their everyday lives. Examples include:

## Fantasy or Story Book Characters

Princesses, Superheroes, etc.

## Attire reflective of different cultures

African Dashiki and Kufi/Wrap Hat, Latino Shirt with Serape, Native American attire, etc.

### **Community Workers**

Mail Carrier, Doctor, Fire Fighter, Police Officer, etc.



### Fancy dress-up clothing

Sequin Dresses, Suits, Dressy Hats, Gowns, etc.

#### Work attire

Overalls, Dress Shirts, Dress Jackets, Uniforms from local businesses, etc.









# Dramatic Play Tips

Props for kitchen play may include:

Eating Utensils

Rolling pin

Dishes

Pots

Pretend Food

Cooking Utensils

Toy Appliances

Dish Towels

Props for cleaning play may include:

Sponges Mop Broom Dust Pan Bucket Toy Vacuum

Props and furniture for pretend play with babies (3 types) Examples include:

Baby Bed High Chair Blankets Bottles Diaper Bag Baby Clothes

Collection of empty containers: A collection of empty containers should be included in the dramatic play area. Ensure all containers are clean before placing them in the center. Include recycled materials such as:

Food Boxes Detergent Bottles Spice Bottles Milk Cartons Juice Bottles

Additional housekeeping accessories (3 Types) Examples include:

Ironing Board/Iron Telephone Cash Register Clock Pet Dishes

Props to encourage beginning reading and writing skills:
