

Why EXPAND Grants?

- In 2021, DECAL contracted with the Urban Institute to conduct stakeholder engagement with Georgia families, child care providers, the early care and education workforce, DECAL staff, and other stakeholder groups about supports Georgia's ECE system needed
- Key recommendation that emerged was to identify possibilities that could strengthen supports to families needing care during "nontraditional" hours
- Urban Institute conducted further research on the need for nontraditional hour child care in Georgia, which informed the development of the grants
- Aligns with many goals detailed in DECAL's Strategic Plan, such as: Expand
 Two Generation (2Gen) approaches to better support children and families and
 Enhance the use of technology and data to better support our stakeholders

What are EXPAND Grants?

- Funded by the American Rescue Plan Act
- Designed to address child care needs during nontraditional hours, such as evenings, overnight, early mornings, weekends and variable shift schedules
- Three types of grants:



I. EXPAND Grants for Licensed Child Care Providers

- Award Amount: \$50,000 \$500,000
- Number of Grantees: 3 5



2. EXPAND Grants for For-Profit Businesses


- Award Amount: \$100,000 \$750,000
- Number of Grantees: 3 4

EXPAND Grants for Licensed Child Care Providers

Purpose



- The purpose of this grant is to support licensed child care providers opening earlier, staying open longer, and/or opening on weekends
- Potential uses of funds include:
 - Staff pay and benefits
 - Child transportation costs
 - Necessary health and safety improvements to support extended hours of operation

Eligible Recipients

Licensed child care providers in good standing with DECAL programs

Number of Grantees

Three to five grantees



Example: Licensed Child Care



- Child care program is located close to a hospital where many employees work 12-hour shifts, such as 7 am to 7 pm
- Program is currently open Monday Friday 7 am to 5 pm
- Program uses grant funds to extend hours to 6 am to 8 pm, and explore feasibility of weekend operations
- Project might include hiring additional staff, installing more outdoor lighting for dark hours, and conducting a needs assessment around the need for weekend care





EXPAND Grants for For-Profit Businesses

Purpose



- The purpose of this grant is to support the exploration and implementation of a project that addresses the need for nontraditional hour child care among businesses' own staff
- Potential uses of funds include:
 - Providing stipends to families for child care expenses
 - Creating resources that can help match families to providers that meet their needs
 - Working with DECAL and other local resources to increase licensed child care options in their community

Eligible Recipients

For-profit businesses

Number of Grantees

Three to four grantees



Example: Business Grants



- Manufacturing plant in North Georgia has found increased absenteeism with parents of young children. Upon further investigation, it is determined that child care needs are part of the problem.
- The plant uses grant funds to create a network of local Family Child Care Providers who can assist by either offering care during nontraditional hours or serve as a resource for emergency child care. Grant funds could be used to fund resources for the business to create a system to help parents access this network.
- Grants could also be used to fund stipends for families (including offering stipends as a hiring bonus).
- Grants could also be used to explore on-site child care options.



EXPAND Collaborative Grants for Government Entities and Nonprofit Organizations

Purpose



 The purpose of this grant is to support government entities and nonprofit organizations to form a collaborative of local community partners and develop and implement a project that addresses the need for nontraditional hour child care in the local community

Potential uses of funds include:

- Providing stipends to families for child care expenses
- Creating resources that can help match families to providers that meet their needs
- Working with DECAL and other local resources to increase licensed child care options in their community

Details

Eligible Recipients



Example: Nonprofit/govt. collaboratives



- A nonprofit foundation convenes a collaborative of partners in the area, including several small businesses with parents working nontraditional hours and local child care providers
- The foundation uses the grant to:
 - Assess the child care needs of the collaborative business partners
 - Work with local child care providers to ensure their capacity to offer care during non-traditional hours
 - Match working families among the collaborative businesses with the child care providers that best meet their needs
 - Help families navigate available resources and create additional resources with the collaborative partners





How to Apply

- Proposals must be submitted to DECAL's SurveyMonkey Apply <u>website</u>.
- Once on the link, click Apply to begin the proposal.
- If you do not have an account already, you will be prompted to register for one.
- In the proposal form, click on Instructions for more information about the grant guidelines.
- Once you have completed all tasks in the proposal form, make sure to submit your proposal.
- Proposals must be submitted by July 17, 2023, 5:00 PM ET.







Proposal Requirements

Content differs by grant type, but the main sections include:

Project abstract and organization description

Who is the applicant organization and what are the goals of the proposed project?

Identified need for nontraditional hour care

What is the local need for nontraditional hour child care that would be addressed by the project?

High-level project plan

How do you propose to address the need?

 Potential partners (only for the Collaborative Grants for Government Entities and Nonprofit Organizations)

Who will you work with to address the need?

Selection Process

- Proposals will be evaluated by DECAL
- Top proposals will be selected to have a conversation with DECAL team about proposed projects before final selection
- Areas of the state with highest need for child care during nontraditional hours may be considered in selection process


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Concluding Thoughts
