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Georgia 2005 Childcare Market Rate Survey

I. Executive Summary

10,266 childcare providers were surveyed by mail in the spring of 2005. Useful responses were received from 4,650 providers. Rate information was collected for different types of care for different age groups for four types of providers; childcare centers, group homes, family childcare and informal providers. Respondents were grouped into three market rate zones based on the county in which they provide their services. The zones represented large urban and suburban areas (Zone 1), smaller urban and suburban areas (Zone 2), and rural areas (Zone 3). Significant findings from the survey results include:

- In regards to weekly rates for weekday care, rates in Zone 1 are much higher than respective rates in the other two zones. Rates in Zone 2 are generally higher than rates in Zone 3. In the case of infant weekday care, the 75th percentile in Zone 1 (\$165.50) is 106% higher than the respective rate in Zone 3 (\$80). This trend is generally consistent across different types of providers and different age groups being served;
- 75th percentile weekly rates for weekday care generally decline as the ages of the children being served increases, although the extent of this decline varies depending on the type of provider. This decline also is most dramatic among providers in Zone 1;
- Childcare centers generally have the highest weekday care rates, followed by family childcare providers, group homes and, at the lowest end of the rate scale, informal providers. There are some minor variations to this pattern;
- The 75th percentile for hourly drop-in rates for center-based providers is \$7.50 per hour, compared to \$7.00 per hour for family childcare providers;
- Surprisingly, however, most respondents who offer drop-in care reported rates based on daily fees; the 75th percentile for center-based providers is \$32 per hour, compared to \$30 per hour for family providers. Again, rates among Zone 1 providers are significantly higher than rates among providers in Zone 3;
- For most types of care across most providers, the 75th percentile weekly rates for weekday care increased modestly between 2003 and 2005. A few categories witnessed more dramatic changes. For example, the 75th percentile rate for group home after-school care increased 50% statewide to \$45;
- The percentage of providers who said they have an email address parents can use to contact the provider varies widely depending on the type of provider and the zone in which services are offered. There is a good chance these percentages are under-representative of the true number who have email access, however.

II. Introduction

In February of 2005, the Division of Family and Children Services (DFCS), a unit of the Georgia Department of Human Resources (DHR), contracted with Georgia State University's School of Social Work (SSW) to conduct the 2005 Georgia Childcare Market Rate Survey. The SSW subcontracted the survey work to the A.L. Burruss Institute of Public Service at Kennesaw State University. The survey is conducted to determine variations in market rates among childcare providers in different areas of the state in order to meet federal requirements under the Child Care and Development Fund program. The results of the survey are used to determine state reimbursement rates to providers who qualify for state subsidies. Similar surveys have been conducted by other organizations on behalf of DFCS periodically since 1991.

Surveys were mailed to 10,266 childcare providers across the state of Georgia. The mailing lists were provided by the DFCS. The surveyed providers included:

- Licensed daycare centers and group homes (2,969 providers)
- Licensed family childcare providers (FCC) (5,756 providers)
- "Informal" daycare providers (1,541 providers)

Licensed daycare centers and group homes are regulated by the state and have varying capacities depending on the size of the respective facilities. Daycare classes offered as part of the state-funded pre-kindergarten (Pre-K) program are limited to 20 children per class. Licensed family childcare providers are regulated by the state and can serve no more than six children not related to the provider. Informal providers are not regulated by the state, although they may care for no more than two unrelated children. They may be eligible for reimbursement from the state for part of the cost of their caregiving, however.

III. Survey Protocol

In order to maximize response rates, the licensed daycare centers, group home providers and informal providers were subjected to a multi-stage survey process. The steps in this process included:

- Survey packets were mailed to all providers in these groups. The packets were mailed from the Burruss Institute and included a cover letter from Ms. Gail Ormsby, Manager of the Child Care Unit of the Office of Family Independence at DFCS. A postage-paid return envelope, addressed to the Burruss Institute, was included in the survey packet;
- Approximately 10 days after the mailing of the first survey packet, a follow-up postcard was mailed to any provider who had not yet returned the Market Rate Survey;
- Approximately one week after the follow up postcard was mailed, a second copy of the Market Rate Survey was sent to providers who had not yet responded;
- One week after the second survey mailing, another postcard reminder was sent to all nonrespondents.

Due to administrative changes at DFCS that created a significant delay in obtaining the mailing list, the survey of family childcare providers was handled differently. Only one mailing was sent to these providers; however, in this case, the mailing was sent out in official DHR envelopes with the same cover letter and a postage-paid return envelope addressed to the Burruss Institute. No follow-up reminder was sent.

In all cases, the survey packets were mailed with first-class postage. The survey of centers and group homes was three legal size pages in length; the survey of family childcare and informal providers was two legal size pages in length.

A toll-free number was provided in the mailings in case the providers had questions about the survey. Burruss Institute staff were trained on the handling of these calls. Approximately three dozen calls were received, mostly from informal providers.

Response Rates

For each group, a number of provider surveys were returned by the U.S. Postal Service as "undeliverable." In addition, a number of providers returned their surveys with information that they no longer provide childcare services. After taking these returns into account, the response rates for each group surveyed are as follows:

- Childcare centers and group homes 1,176 responses (1,076 centers and 100 group homes) out of 2,817 total potential valid respondents (42%);
- Family childcare providers 1,394 out of 5,557 potential valid respondents (25%);
- Informal childcare providers 439 out of 1,436 potential valid respondents (31%).

Types of Data Collected

Market rate data was collected for different types of care and, in most cases, for different age categories. This information includes:

Types of Care

- Weekday care
- Overnight/Evening care
- Weekend care
- Drop-in care
- Before school only, after school only, before and after school (combined) and summer care

Age Groups

- Infants (6 weeks 12 months)
- Toddlers (13 35 months)
- 3-year olds (36 47 months)
- 4-year olds (48-59 months)
- 5 year olds not in school (60 71 months)
- 5-12 year olds in school (overnight and weekend care only)

No age differentiation was made for drop-in, before and after school care and summer care rates.

In addition, the state of Georgia differentiates rates across three market zones. These market zones are based on the counties in which the providers are located. The zones were developed to allow the state to take into account significantly higher childcare rates in the Atlanta market. The zones are as follows:

• Zone 1 – includes counties in the greater metro Atlanta area and, beginning in 2005, Camden County, which is affected by the large Jacksonville, Florida market;

- Zone 2 includes counties located in other urban and suburban areas;
- Zone 3 includes counties located in rural areas, smaller cities and towns.

These zones are developed by the state for previous market rate surveys and are adjusted from year to year. Counties comprising each zone can be found in Appendix B.

IV. Results of the Market Rate Survey

Tables 1A - 1E contain the statewide results of the market rate survey for each type of care and age group served. Results for each zone are provided also. With the exception of drop-in rates, all rates reported in these tables are based on *weekly* childcare rates. The results provided include the number of respondents in each category for the state as a whole ("Count") and the 75th percentile rate for providers in the state as a whole and within each zone. The 75th percentile rate is the rate at which 25% of the providers charge more than the stated rate and 75% of the providers charge less than the stated rate.

Analysis

The results for weekday care, as reflected in Table 1A, are most useful and lead to a number of important general conclusions:

- There are clear, significant differences in the market rates for providers across the different zones, as represented by the 75th percentile rates in each zone. Rates in the large urban markets (Zone 1) are generally much higher than the rates in Zone 2, and the rates in Zone 2 are significantly higher than those in the rural areas comprising Zone 3. In the case of infant weekday care, the 75th percentile rate for childcare centers statewide is \$135; across the three zones, however, this rate ranges from a high in Zone 1 of \$165.50 (123% of the statewide rate) to a low of \$80 (59% of the statewide rate) among Zone 3 center-based providers. This general trend is consistent across each of the provider types and respective age groups.
- Weekday childcare rates decline as the children being served grow older. The statewide 75th percentile rate for center-based weekday infant care is \$135; that figure declines steadily across older age groups (see Table 1A). The statewide 75th percentile for center-based weekday care of five year olds is just \$105. This decline in the 75th percentile rate for care across older age groups is similarly pronounced among Zone 1 centers; the decline in the respective rates in Zones 2 and 3 are far less pronounced, however. There appears to be much more stability in age-based rates in these zones.
- At the statewide level, 75th percentile rates are highest for center-based providers for each of the age groups served, followed by family care providers, group homes and informal providers. Using infant weekday care again as an example, the 75th percentile for statewide center-based care is \$135, followed by family childcare providers (\$110), group homes (\$90) and informal providers (\$75). There are some minor variations from this pattern within individual market zones. Most of these are the result of relatively small fluctuations in the rates of group home providers and family childcare providers.
- While the patterns mentioned above describe the results for weekly weekday care quite well, they do not reflect the results for overnight care (Table 1B). The extent to which the results can be used to ascertain reliable overnight weekly rates suffers from two significant problems. First, the relatively small number of providers (particularly among centers, group homes and informal

caregivers) who said they provide this type of care. The small sample sizes result in very unstable estimates of the respective rates. Second, a visual examination of the responses as they were returned indicated there is quite likely a problem with the format of the question about overnight rates. It is clear that some respondents were responding to the question based on the rates they charge for a few hours of evening care (for example, during a "parents night out" situation), while others were responding based on their rates for true "overnight" care. For all practical purposes, the results for this question reflect a mixing of apples and oranges.

- The results for weekend care (Table 1C) reflect to a large extent the same problems encountered in regards to overnight care.
- 75th percentile rates for before school, after school care and summer care for Zone 1 providers of all types are significantly higher than the rates for providers in Zone 3 (Table 1D). The number of group home providers and informal providers who said they provide these types of care is relatively small, however, and the results for these groups within the respective zones should be viewed with caution.
- In regards to drop-in rates, respondents were allowed to respond based either on hourly fees or daily fees. Relatively few respondents provided information based on hourly fees, even though hourly fees are more consistent with the concept of "drop-in" care. It is clear, however, that hourly drop in rates cannot be extrapolated to reflect daily rates (and vice-versa), because the extrapolated daily rates for those who charge by the hour would be very extreme in nature and would bias the data. Using the hourly rates reported in the 2005 survey, a typical day's drop-in rate would approach \$60. Comparing that figure to the average daily rate reported in the 2005 survey, the \$60 figure is clearly out-of-line. Accordingly, rates for drop-in care are reported separately for both hourly and daily drop-in care.
- Among those statewide center-based providers who responded with an hourly rate, the 75th percentile is \$7.50 per hour, compared to \$7.00 per hour for family childcare providers statewide (see Table 1E). Providers in these two groups in Zone 1 again reflect significantly higher 75th percentile hourly rates than do comparable providers in Zone 3. The small number of group home and informal provider respondents who provided an hourly rate prevents meaningful interpretation of the data for those particular groups.
- Most respondents who offer drop-in care reported their rates on a daily basis. The 75th percentile daily rate for statewide center-based care is \$32, compared to \$30 for family childcare providers and \$20 for both group home and informal providers. Once again, rates among all providers in Zone 1 are significantly higher than those for providers of all types in Zone 3.

V. Historical Trends in Weekday Care

For center-based care, the 75th percentile weekly rate for infant weekday care increased \$10 (8%) between 2003 and 2005. This same rate also increased \$10 (10%) for family childcare providers during that time period. The rates for group home and informal providers did not change.

In regard to three-year old care, the 75^{th} percentile rate increased just \$5 (4.5%) for center-based providers, and \$10 (11%) for family childcare providers. The rate actually decreased slightly for group home providers (-\$2.75, -3%), and more markedly for informal providers (-\$14, -17.7%).

For after-school care, 75th percentile rates increased 50% (by \$15) for group home providers between 2003 and 2005. The rate for informal providers increased by \$8 (19%) during that time. Rates for center-based providers (9%) and family childcare providers (11%) increased at significant but more modest rates.

VI. Additional Information from the 2005 Market Rate Survey

Registration Fees

Table 3 provides a summary of the results related to registration fees, broken down by market zone and type of provider. The *median* registration fee is reported for each category. The *median* value is the equivalent of a 50th percentile rate; that is, the median is the rate at which one-half (50%) of the providers charge less and one-half of the providers charge more. The percentage of providers in each category who said they charge a registration fee is also provided. Several conclusions are apparent:

- Informal providers rarely charge registration fees; the median fees for those who said they do charge fees are generally lower than the fees charged by other types of providers.
- The vast majority of center-based providers in all three market zones and group home providers in Zones 1 & 2 charge registration fees. Just over a majority (57%) of group home providers in Zone 3 charge a fee. The median fee for these groups of providers ranges from \$35 for Zone 3 centers to \$50 for centers in Zones 1 & 2.
- Fewer family childcare providers charge fees, particularly in Zone 3.

It is important to remember that many childcare providers who charge registration fees often provide discounts to families who enroll more than one child at the same center. Fees may vary depending on other factors as well. The survey instruments were not designed to take these variations into account. As best as possible, the fees represented by these results represent the registration fee for one child.

State Reimbursement for Feeding of Children

Providers were asked if they receive state money for the feeding of children in their care and, if so, how many children they received money for from the state. Table 4 provides a breakdown of the percentage of providers in each category who said they receive money from the state for the feeding of children in their care, and the median number of children for whom providers receive funding.

Relatively few informal providers indicated they receive funding for the feeding of the children in their care. Significantly fewer center-based providers in Zone 1 said they receive state money for the feeding of their children compared to centers in the other zones. Although a larger percentage of centers in Zone 3 said they receive money from the state for this purpose, the median number of children they receive funding for is significantly smaller than is the case for centers in Zones 1 & 2.

State Reimbursement for Care of Children

Table 5 provides a similar breakdown for the question about whether or not the providers receive money from the state for the care of children. Family childcare providers in all three market zones are significantly less likely to receive money from the state for the care of children.

Funding for Head Start Childcare

Some childcare centers operate Head Start Programs and receive funding for that program. Table 6 provides a summary of the percentage of centers in each Zone that receive Head Start funding, and the median number of children served in Head Start Programs in each Zone.

State Funding for Georgia Pre-K Programs

The State of Georgia subsidizes Pre-K programs from the proceeds of sales from the Georgia Lottery. Table 7 provides a summary of the percentage of center-based providers in each Zone who receive state money for Pre-K programs, and the median number of children served by these providers in each market zone. Individual Pre-K classes are limited to 20 children, although a daycare center may offer more than one Pre-K class, depending on the size of the center itself.

Significantly more centers in Zone 1 (54%) receive funding for Pre-K programs than do centers in Zone 2 (35%) or Zone 3 (23%).

Do Providers Have E-Mail and Internet Access?

Providers also were asked if they have an email address that parents can use to contact them, and whether or not they have internet access. Table 8 provides a breakdown of the percentage of providers in each Market Zone who do have these tools available.

The results indicate a majority of childcare centers, group homes and family childcare providers in all three market zones have access to the internet. This is true for over 80% of the center based providers in all three zones. Far fewer informal providers indicated they have internet access; the highest percentage is 47% of the informal providers in Zone 1.

The results for email availability tell a slightly different story, although these results must be viewed with caution. Only two provider subgroups – center-based providers in Zone 1 and Zone 2 – have a majority who said they have an email address parents can use to contact them. Not unexpectedly, very few informal providers indicated they have an email address.

There is reason to believe that these results may be under-reported, however. Many people are naturally hesitant to reveal email information; in fact, many respondents who said they have email neglected to provide their actual email address. Also, the percentage of respondents in each subgroup who said they have email is generally much lower than the percentage who have internet access. If they have internet access, they have the ability to set up an email account either directly through their ISP or through a free service such as Yahoo or Hotmail. It is quite likely, therefore, that larger numbers of respondents actually have email access but have chosen not to share that information.

VII. Detailed Market Rate Survey Results

Tables 9A - 9D provide more detailed market rate information for providers statewide (Table 9A) and each of the three market zones (Tables 9B - 9D). In addition to the number ("Count") of provider respondents in each category, information included in these tables includes:

- The 25th, 50th and 75th percentile rates for each provider subgroup in each category of care. The 25th percentile is the rate that divides the lowest 25% of providers in terms of rates charged from the top 75% of providers. The 50th percentile, which is more commonly known as the *median*, is the rate at which one-half of the providers charge less and one-half charge more.
- The *mean*, or average, rate for providers in that category. While most people are more familiar with this measure of central tendency, mean scores are, in fact, more susceptible to bias when extreme values are present or the distribution of scores are skewed in a particular direction. This problem is exacerbated when mean scores are based on relatively small numbers of respondents.
- The *standard deviation* of the mean, which is a measure of dispersion of the distribution of rates around the mean score. The smaller the standard deviation, the more closely bunched the distribution of rates is around the mean.

The data in these tables do not change the general conclusions discussed earlier in this report; these results are simply an expanded version of the tables presented earlier. The tables are particularly helpful, however, in identifying those types of care where the data for certain provider subgroups suffer from extremely small sample sizes. Particularly problematic are rates for evening/overnight care and weekend care for group home and informal providers in the individual zones. Other subroups may suffer from this problem as well, however, on a more random basis.



APPENDIX C DEFINITION OF TERMS

Statistical Terms

Median and	
Percentiles	

The median is the rate at which one-half of the respondents charge *that rate or less*; and the other half charge *that rate or more*. For example, if the respondents were ranked in descending order based on their value on the rate under examination, the median would be the rate at which the respondents are evenly divided into two groups. The median of \$50, \$60, \$70, \$75, and \$85 is \$70.

The median is also known as the 50^{th} percentile. Medians are less prone to being biased by extreme values. In the example above, if the highest value had been \$145 instead of \$85, the median would still be \$70. Means, on the other hand, can be affected more by extreme scores.

Mean

The mean is simply the arithmetic average. In the above example, the mean is \$68. However, if the highest score had been \$145 instead of \$85, the mean would be \$80.

Standard Deviation

The standard deviation is a measure of dispersion of the distribution of rates around the mean score. The smaller the standard deviation, the more closely bunched the

distribution of rates is around the mean.

Count

The count is the number of respondents from whom valid data was received. When examining a particular statistic, such as the mean or median, it is often important to know the count (or "number of cases") upon which the statistic is based. Statistics based on a small number of cases are often unstable and unreliable.

Types of Childcare Providers

Childcare Centers provide less than 24-hour care for 19 or more children in a specialized facility. Center Centers are licensed by the state.

Group Childcare Home Group homes provide less than 24-hour care for between seven and eighteen children not related to the provider. Group homes are licensed by the state.

Family Childcare

Family Childcare providers (FCC) offer less than 24-hour care for three to six children not related to the provider. Care is provided in private residences. FCC providers must register with the state.

Informal Childcare

Informal providers offer less than 24-hour care for one or more children in the child's own home, the caregivers's home, or the home of a friend, neighbor, or other relative; limited to two children unrelated or six children related to the caregiver.

Types of Childcare

Weekday Childcare Care and supervision of children Monday through Friday, typically between

the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

Night/Overnight Care Care and supervision of children during the the evening or night for a period

of 6 to 12 hours between 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.

Weekend Care Care and supervision of children during the weekend between 6:00 p.m.

Friday and 6:00 a.m. Monday.

Part-time/Drop-in Care Part-time care or short-term care provided on an hourly basis as space is

available. (Rates reported as hourly.)

Before-and-After

School Care

Care for school-aged children several hours before and after school.

Before-School Care Care for school-aged children for at least one hour before school.

After-School Care Care for school-aged children for up to several hours after school.

Summer Care Care for school-aged children during the summer.
