

What are Community Impact Grants?

- Funded by Georgia's Child Care Development Fund (CCDF)
- Three types of 2-year grants:

2Gen Innovation Grants for Student Parent Success



- Award Amount: Up to \$75,000
- Number of Grantees: 6

2Gen Community Literacy Grants



- Award Amount: Up to \$75,000
- Number of Grantees: 6

Community Transformation Grants




- Award Amount: Up to \$125,000
- Number of Grantees: 6



Purposes of Community Impact Grants

- Support community-specific solutions and innovations that:
 - address critical local needs
 - help families access resources related to high-quality early learning
 - build strong community support systems
 - close possible opportunity gaps
 - enhance the well-being of families with children from birth to 8 years old.
- Programs funded by this grant will be required to create cross-sector collaboration among community organizations that serve both adults and children.

2Gen Innovation Grants for Student Parent Success



- To launch or expand innovative strategies that bridge early learning with secondary, postsecondary, and workforce systems at the local level.
- To enhance children's access to high-quality early education while also improving parents' ability to secure family-supporting jobs, thereby fostering greater economic security.

DECAL will award grants up to \$75,000 each to six communities in Georgia.

Year 1: \$50,000

Year 2: \$25,000



Grant Application Guidelines



Projects must be aligned with the following 5 Principles of 2Gen Approaches from Ascend at the Aspen Institute adopted by Georgia's 2Gen Academy.

- Measure and account for outcomes for both children and adults in their lives
- Engage and listen to the voices of families
- Ensure racial, gender, and economic equity
- Foster innovation and evidence together
- Align and link systems and funding streams



Components of Grant Application



- Strategy and Program Design
- Partnerships and Collaboration
- Implementation and Sustainability
- Outcomes and Evaluation
- Capacity and Readiness
- Budget and Budget Narrative



Project Ideas



- Bring secondary education or postsecondary education courses to the site (or nearby) of a child care program or Head Start program.
- Hire a part-time career coach to meet with parents at child care programs and help them connect with workforce training and secondary or postsecondary options in their community.
- Offer Student Parent Ambassador events on college campuses for student parents.
- Host cross-training opportunities for technical college student navigators and local representatives of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), or other assistance programs that will allow them to meet and learn about each other.
- Create a family resource center on a college campus.



Accelerating Literacy Efforts for Families Across Georgia



2Gen Community Literacy Grants



- Focused on improving literacy skills across generations, often incorporating adult education, early childhood education, and family engagement strategies to create a supportive learning environment.
- This grant will support the Georgia Early Literacy Act (House Bill 538) which aims to enhance early reading instruction for students in kindergarten through third grade.

DECAL will award grants of up to \$75,000 each to six communities in Georgia.

Year 1: \$50,000

Year 2: \$25,000

Project Ideas



- Design parent engagement sessions that connect child care and/or Georgia's Pre-K with Secondary or Postsecondary Education.
- Conduct workshops where parents learn effective read-aloud techniques, phonemic awareness activities, and ways to create a literacy-rich home environment. Include sessions where parents practice these strategies with their children.
- Establish local centers stocked with books, educational games, and digital literacy tools.
- Host monthly themed literacy nights at local schools or community centers, featuring read-aloud sessions, storytelling, and interactive literacy games. Provide take-home materials to encourage continued family reading practices.

Community Transformation Grants





- Establish new partnerships or enhance existing ones composed of community agencies and other stakeholders to design, tailor, and implement innovative projects.
- Increase access to early childhood services and resources.

DECAL will award grants of up to \$125,000 each to six communities in Georgia.

○ Year 1: \$75,000

○ Year 2: \$50,000

Focus Areas

 Select one primary Focus Area from the list of 12 to complete your application.

Or

 Select one primary Focus Area and blend it with up to two secondary Focus Areas from the list of 12 to complete your application.



Community Transformation Grants- Focus Areas

- Increase access to high-quality early childhood programs for infants and toddlers (6 weeks to 36 months).
- Increase access to high-quality early childhood programs for dual language learners.
- Increase access to high-quality early childhood programs for children living in rural areas of Georgia.
- Support children with social-emotional and behavioral needs.
- Reduce food insecurity for children and their families.
- Strengthen and coordinate early learning services for children in foster care or protective services to ensure they have needed supports and resources.

Unless otherwise specified, please consider the target age range for children from birth to 8 years old.

Community Transformation Grants- Focus Areas

- Provide mental health services for children and their parents and caregivers.
- Provide enhanced services to young children related to the early identification and treatment of developmental delays and disabilities.
- Develop a system of care to support children and their families experiencing homelessness.
- Support the ECE workforce (including early childhood teachers, program directors and administrators, family child care providers, and other ECE professionals working directly with children and families in ECE programs).
- Enhance and coordinate services for children and families who have experienced trauma, fostering a community that provides trauma-responsive care.
- Expand access to a unique educational approach that combines visual arts, music, dance, theater, and other forms of art.

Project Ideas



- Partner with a vendor to provide eye screenings, exams, and fittings for glasses to students in schools and child care programs.
- Develop and deliver professional development workshops focused on integrating visual arts, music, dance, and theater into early childhood curricula in rural areas
- Offer family engagement opportunities to your community with materials in a variety of home languages
- Partner with mental health professionals to offer on-site services for children and their families living in homeless shelters



Community Impact Grants Funding



Permissible Uses of Funds

Category	Examples
Administrative	Background checks
Contracted Services	Expenses paid to external contractors (e.g., project managers, trainers, event space, speakers, evaluators)
Educational Expenses for Student Parents	Fees, materials, and/or supplies for student parents enrolled in higher education
Family Assistance for Child Care	Child care expenses related to providing services through this grant (includes offering licensed child care as an option for meetings or project activity)
Fringe Benefits	Non-salary benefits for staff
Maintenance/Renovations	Expenses for non-capital health and safety improvements of child care facilities
Marketing/Outreach	Printing costs and promotional expenses
Materials/Supplies	Expenses for educational items, books, non-food items
Technology	Technology and software expenses
Training/Professional Development	Expenses for staff trainings; rental for meeting or office space
Transportation	Mileage and parking costs can be permissible if related to direct services
Wages/Salary	Employee salaries; limited to 33% of the grant award amount



Prohibited Uses of Funds

- Food and meals
- . Staff salaries for work unrelated to Community Impact Grants
- . Child care expenses such as regular tuition for parents or families
- Capital improvements to buildings and facilities
- Office equipment, including refrigerators, printers, computer
 equipment, and other technology (unless necessary to perform
 under CIG and specifically approved by DECAL in writing)





How to Apply


- Applications must be submitted to DECAL's SurveyMonkey Apply website.




