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Beyond the Rule: A Path to Quality Care

Each issue of The Quality Connection will focus on one classroom component and will identify connections between requirements and expectations of DECAL's various divisions and the impact each one has on classroom practices. The Quality Connection aims to illustrate how all DECAL programs are part of the Quality Continuum and designed to work together toward continuous quality improvement.

Inclusive Practices

- Space large enough for all children to move around freely and safely
- -Print materials of differing abilities in the dramatic play area, helps children to begin understanding diversity (ex. people with hearing or visual equipment, or adaptive equipment for mobility)
 - -Dress-up clothing/costumes should be easily worn (ex. Velcro closures, slide on/off, etc.)

Foundational Practices

- -Variety of age & developmentally appropriate materials available/accessible
 - -Materials in good repair
- -Schedule reflects opportunities for child-directed, free choice dramatic play time

Quality Practices

- Children allowed to use dramatic play materials independently to cultivate creativity and imagination
- -Examples of diversity represented in materials, including culture, race, age, gender, and ability
 - Opportunities for language development provided through positive interactions & teacher communication and engagement

GA Pre-K Practices

- -Materials labeled and organized within the dramatic play area
- Props to encourage beginning reading and writing skills are included
 - -Variety of prop boxes for dramatic play themes are provided and routinely rotated

ROOM ARRANGEMENT

An inviting dramatic play center encourages children to be creative. Store labeled, organized materials on low, accessible shelves. Rotating prop boxes periodically gives the opportunity to explore a variety of dramatic play themes. Examples of themes for prop boxes include birthday celebration, picnic, flower shop, or office.

The area should be large enough so that several children playing can be active and noisy without interrupting other activities.
